ADMINISTRATION POLICY:

IV Infusion - May be administered by a nurse MINI-BAG PLUS COMPATIBLE

IV Bolus - Not recommended Subcutaneous - Not recommended IM Injection Not recommended

RECONSTITUTION/DILUTION/ADMINISTRATION:

Available as: 500 mg vial

Reconstitution: Add 4.8 mL sterile water for injection.

Final volume: 5 mL Final concentration: 100 mg/mL

IV Intermittent: MINI-BAG PLUS COMPATIBLE

Dilute dose in 250 mL normal saline and infuse over at least 1 hour

DOSAGE:

Usual: 500 mg IV daily

Maximum rate:

2 mg/mL in 250 mL over 1 hour **Maximum concentration:**

Maximum single dose: 500 mg Maximum daily dose: 500 mg

STABILITY/COMPATIBILITY:

Stability of Reconstituted Solution: 24 hours at room temperature **Stability of Final Admixture:** 24 hours at room temperature

Compatibility: Compatible with normal saline, D5W, dextrose/saline combinations

PRECAUTIONS, POTENTIAL ADVERSE REACTIONS:

- GI: nausea, vomiting, diarrhea, abdominal pain, flatulence
- Dermatologic: injection site reaction
- Hepatic: increased liver enzymes

• CNS: headache

ADDITIONAL NOTES AND NURSING CONSIDERATIONS:

• Monitor liver enzymes and GFR values if patient is at risk for renal or hepatic impairment
