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ADMINISTRATION POLICY:

IV Bolus - May be administered by a nurse
IV Intermittent - May be administered by a nurse
IM Injection - May be administered by a nurse

Subcutaneous - Not recommended

RECONSTITUTION/DILUTION/ADMINISTRATION:

Available as: 50 mg/mL - 1 mL vials

IV Bolus: Administer undiluted over 2 to 3 minutes

IV Intermittent: Dilute in 50 mL normal saline.

Administer over 15 to 30 minutes.

IM Injection: Inject undiluted deeply into a large muscle.

Subcutaneous: Not recommended due to pain at injection site and possible tissue necrosis

Maximum rate: 25 mg/minute **Maximum concentration:** 50 mg/mL

DOSAGE:

Usual: 25 to 50 mg IV/IM every 4 to 6 hours

Maximum single dose: 100 mg **Maximum daily dose:** 400 mg

STABILITY/COMPATIBILITY:

Stability of Diluted Solution: 24 hours at room temperature.

Compatibility: Compatible in normal saline, D5W, Lactated Ringer

PRECAUTIONS, POTENTIAL ADVERSE REACTIONS:

• Drowsiness, dizziness, confusion, irritability, blurred vision, urinary retention, dry mouth.

ADDITIONAL NOTES AND NURSING CONSIDERATIONS:

- Use in contraindicated in patients with narrow angle glaucoma, prostatic hypertrophy, stenosing peptic ulcer, pyloroduodenal or bladder-neck obstruction.
- May potentiate other CNS depressants such as hypnotics and sedatives.
- Elderly patients: may be more sensitive to hypotensive, sedative and anticholinergic effects.
