ADMINISTRATION POLICY:

IV Bolus – Administration restricted to nurses under direct supervision of prescriber

IV Intermittent – May be administered by a nurse

IV Infusion – *Not recommended*

IM Injection — May be administered by a nurse

RECONSTITUTION/DILUTION/ADMINISTRATION:

Available as: 20 mg/mL vial

IV Bolus: May be administered undiluted over 1 to 2 minutes

IV Intermittent: Dilute dose in 50 mL mini bag normal saline. Administer over 15 to 30 minutes.

IM Injection: Administer undiluted

DOSAGE:

Usual:

IV bolus: 5 to 20 mg every 4 to 6 hours as needed. In hypertensive emergencies, may be given

every 20 to 40 minutes according to response.

IV intermittent/ IM: 5 to 20 mg every 4 to 6 hours as needed. In hypertensive emergencies, may be given

every 20 to 40 minutes according to response.

Maximum single dose: 40 mg Maximum daily dose: 120 mg

Maximum rate: IV bolus: 5 mg/minute

Maximum concentration: 20 mg/mL

STABILITY/COMPATIBILITY:

Stability of reconstituted Solution: Use immediately; discard any unused portion

Stability of diluted Solution: 24 hours

Compatibility: Compatible with normal saline and Lactated Ringer

Incompatible with D5W

PRECAUTIONS, POTENTIAL ADVERSE REACTIONS:

- Use caution in patients with severe renal dysfunction, coronary or cerebral ischemia
- A sudden and dramatic decrease in blood pressure may occur with too rapid of an injection
- Hypotension, palpitations, tachycardia, angina, dizziness
- Headache, neuropathy
- Nausea and vomiting
- Lupus-like syndrome

ADDITIONAL NOTES AND NURSING CONSIDERATIONS:

- Monitor blood pressure and heart rate
- Onset of action: 5 to 20 minutes, maximum effect: 10 to 80 minutes. Duration of action: 2 to 6 hours
