

Baby Friendly Initiative (BFI) for Southern Health-Santé Sud BFI Staff Information Handout

What is Baby Friendly Initiative (BFI)?

- A World Health Organization (WHO) and UNICEF global standard and an important designation awarded to health organizations.
- BFI was developed because the WHO and UNICEF noticed a worldwide higher incidence of illness and death of non-breastfed babies.
- Inclusive of all babies, regardless of how they are fed.
- This region is committed to achieving BFI designation.

Why Breastfeed?

- Provides normal and optimal nutrition for babies.
- Increases babies' immunity.
- Provides protection for many illnesses and diseases for both mom and babies.
- Breastmilk can't be replicated artificially as it is always changing to provide what the baby needs throughout the day, week or month.

Why not use Infant Formula?

- Provides no immunity and does not protect against infections.
- Hard to digest and can cause bacterial infections.
- Errors can be made when preparing formula.

What is the International Code of Marketing of Breastmilk Substitute?

- Provides minimum requirements that this facility has to meet to show that the work we do, related to infant feeding, is unbiased, face-based and free from commercial influences.
- Applies to all of our regions messaging about infant formula, other milks, infant teas or juices, feeding bottles and pacifiers (no advertising or promotion of products in the Region).
- Encourages families to make informed decisions using evidence based information on how to feed their babies.

What is your role? All Southern Health-Santé Sud staff will:

- 1. Create a welcoming environment for breastfeeding families.
 - All families who wish to breastfeed or pump breastmilk can do so in all Southern Health-Santé Sud faculties.
 - Offer a clean space with comfortable chairs.
 - Provide a private space if requested and available.
 - Don't display posters, pamphlets, resources, etc. showing the use of feeding bottles, pacifiers or infant formula.
 - Don't ask the breastfeeding family to leave, cover up or to use a restroom.

2. Know the basics of the Breastfeeding Policy and Procedures

- Southern Health-Santé Sud supports exclusive breastfeeding until the baby is 6 months old.
- Southern Health-Santé Sud supports breastfeeding to 2 years and beyond with the introduction of complimentary foods at 6
 months.
- Ensure that materials distributed to the public by staff meet BFI Standards No ads for formula in our region.
