

Priority Level	Ideal Time frame	Presenting Concerns/Diagnosis
1	Within 2 weeks	<ul> <li>→ Feeding concerns         <ul> <li>Failure to thrive; weight loss</li> </ul> </li> <li>→ High risk infants pre or post discharge (initial contact may clarify priority rating)         <ul> <li>Premature; with recommendation from hospital clinician to see on a priority basis</li> </ul> </li> <li>→ Transfer assessment and environmental accessibility in relation to acute/urgent medical needs/interventions or pending hospital discharge.</li> </ul>
2	4-6 weeks	<ul> <li>Children referred for feeding difficulties which are sensory motor in nature</li> <li>Children with diagnosed developmental concerns, i.e., referrals from Newborn/Neonatal Follow Up Clinic, HSC – Child Health (Children's Hospital), St. Boniface Hospital, Child Development Clinic or pediatricians.</li> <li>Children less than two years of age with developmental concerns.</li> <li>Children with suspected developmental or genetic disorders</li> <li>Hospital discharge plans with hospital discharge date within next 6 months requiring home accessibility assessment and/or lifts and transfers assessment.</li> <li>Safety concerns – the child is at risk of injury to self or others (e.g., biting, hitting, running away, extreme head banging)</li> </ul>
3	6-12 weeks	<ul> <li>Preschool children age two and older who:         <ul> <li>are in a transitional period (i.e. beginning nursery school, day care or school transition) and require therapy input to ensure optimal functioning.             <ul> <li>NOTE: Children for whom school entry is imminent should be pulled forward to Priority 2</li> <li>demonstrate emerging skills that can be fostered with immediate intervention (i.e. preschool screen referrals).</li> <li>Clients transitioning to adult program within the upcoming year (17 years of age or older).</li> <li>Clients with progression of chronic illnesses or non-acute injuries requiring home and/or vehicle accessibility assessment and/or lifts and transfers assessment.</li> </ul> </li> </ul></li></ul>
4	3 months +	<ul> <li>→ Age five and older with neurodevelopmental concerns</li> <li>→ Non-urgent home needs for school aged children.</li> <li>→ Self-regulation/therapeutic group (e.g., fine motor skills, social skills, "How does your engine run") referrals will be placed in an age/developmentally appropriate level group as space allows in order of receipt of referral.</li> <li>→ Preschool age children requiring planning and assessment of future home and vehicle accessibility needs</li> </ul>

Notes:

- 1. Therapist's clinical judgement may impact the Priority Level assigned, shifting a referral into a category other than where it would fall based solely on the above criteria.
- 2. It may not be possible to meet the "Ideal Time Frame" due to various factors, e.g., staffing, referral rates, etc.
- 3. The Priority Rating is best suited for preschool or out-patient school-age services. Criteria for school-based services will be addressed at another time.
