REPORTING REQUIREMENT: In compliance with provincial legislation and Manitoba	RESPONSIBILITY

INTAKE		
☐ A healthcare professional determines that a patient/client is at risk of serious harm to him/herself, towards another individual (group) &/or public safety based on clinical assessment/ consultation.	•	
☐ The healthcare professional must disclose to the patient/client, or that person's substitute decision maker, that they have an ethical Duty to Warn other stakeholders and in certain circumstances the local Police /RCMP/First Nations Police Detachments may be notified of a patient/client at risk of serious harm to self, an individual/group and/or to public safety with or without patient/client consent.		
☐ The healthcare professional completes documentation of all discussions, assessments and actions taken by completing the "Duty to Warn Guideline Form" and retains the form on the patient's/client's health record.	•	
■ Notify your immediate direct Supervisor/ Manager of the event and that a "Duty to Warn Guideline Form" has been completed.	•	
FOLLOW-UP		
☐ The direct Supervisor/Manager follows up and confirms that the healthcare professional completed the "Duty to Warn Guideline Form", and assists with implementing a mitigation plan and strategies/safeguards to prevent future harm.		•
Note		

Once the risk has passed, the disclosure of further Personal Health Information without consent is no longer authorized. Any other disclosure of information to police (Local Police Service or Royal Canadian Mounted Police or First Nations Police Detachment) must be done in accordance with Southern Health Santé Sud Personal Health Information Act Policy (<u>Disclosure of Personal Health Information to Police</u>).
